Feedback has been largely positive, though minor manual errors were identified for future revision. EAL & Assessment Tool (CCLB) The Language & Assessment Tool was developed in collaboration with Canadian Language Benchmarks and Alberta Workplace Essential Skills to support instructors in evaluating basic English comprehension. Students who do not pass the assessment are redirected to appropriate resources and may audit the course. The pilot program was successful, with a broader rollout planned for January 2026. DCFS & H2S Course Statistics -from January – September 2025, Approximately 65,000 students successfully certified in H2S Alive. Over 6,000 students completed certification through the Blended format, reflecting its growing popularity. Jennyfer and Matt Broughton gave an update on a pilot COR Partnership and ESC are conducting in Lloydminster with SAExploration on a new proposed audit process that will reduce the documentation validation and concentrate more on observances of field crews and safety programs. The early conclusions are positive. There is a proposal to have external audits every 3rd year with interim Action Plans focused on where companies should be improving their programs. Join the Drops Canadian Chapter, it is free. WCB Regulator packages were presented in written form. Leigh-Ann with AB WCB stressed looking at their portal and subscribing to their newsletter. Jordan talked about their Creative Sentencing project and Andy gave an update on the Blaster courses and program. There are new Explosives Act changes for Transport Permits and training when carrying explosives see Gazette 1 for details. Energy Safety Canada	COR Next meeting Mar 12 2026	Dec 3 2025	Minutes are available. Safety Share - winter driving. COR offline tool has been completed - a few bugs have been corrected. SECOR online audit tool is active on the website, 50+ companies have used it and provided positive feedback. Andy Reimer presented on the proposed changes in the COR process, to make it more SIF relative, using HOP principles, new tools (e.g. Energy Wheel) and with less document checking, but more observance of actual field and office H&S Systems. The term CBSA (competency based scalable audit) is replaced with Adaptive Audit. Alberta CPs have done some pilots in conjunction with ESC using this new process (e.g. SAE Matt Broughton). Saskatchewan are funding ESC to develop a new COR system that mirrors AB. BC is waiting for AB before adopting similar COR requirements, so is unchanged for the time being. We have been pushing for audits every 3rd year with Action Plans in the other years to focus on specific improvements to a company's HS Systems. Also emphasizing Harmonization and Standardization and establishing equivalencies between COR & ISO etc.

Saskatchewan	SK1 Caribou Working Group (table 4)	Nov 27 2025	Working group meeting online for Table 4. Tables 5 & 6 to come before release of plan. Woodland Caribou are stable in SK1 and access is very sparse. They will provide plans for Road and Trail framework to reach the resource rich areas. Wildfire is more significant as a threat to Caribou. Commercial activity is limited to mining, uranium, etc. Forestry and Oil & Gas is minimal. Generally the guidelines will be tiered and similar to the SK2 range plans. Hunting is minimal as the preferred species are the barren-ground species of caribou. Competition from Moose and deer is less than SK2, predators are not as prolific as there has not been the same volume of activity and linear development.

Worksafe BC	Blaster - Professional Development	on-going	For holders of a BC Blaster's certificate, every year during the term of a blaster's certificate, the blaster must receive at least 6 hours of continuing professional development (CPD) relating to blasting best practices. It is important for CPD hours to be verifiable (e.g., via a certificate of course completion, and proof of attendance). See the Link for this form which can be completed and signed by both the blaster and the employer or manager. Also, you can view this information sheet for a list of suggested training topics. While this is a BC Blaster certification requirement, holders of an Energy Safety Canada Blaster certificate are not at this time mandated to take this annual training although it could be considered a safe work practice (swp). Although it would be considered best practice for all blasters to receive at least 6 hours of continuing professional development (CPD) relating to blasting best practices. It is only mandatory for blasters holding a WorkSafeBC blasting certificate not backed by another jurisdiction. Worksafe BC	Safety Alert Manual Falling & Supervision	on-going	<p>Safety Alert – Supervision of Manual Falling Activity: Due to 2 recent fatalities; a near miss that could have caused a fatality and an injury rate in the Manual Tree Falling Classification nearly 10 times the BC provincial average, the Prevention Services division of Worksafe BC has distributed an advisory letter to industries involved in these types of falling activities. During inspections, they have identified a lack of adequate supervision as a primary factor including inadequate time spent in planning falling work, notably at work sites where the supervisor had a dual role also as an active faller. Inappropriate supervision at work sites with changing conditions that introduces higher levels of risk and a need for effective supervision of supervisors by Employers & Prime Contractors were also identified as areas of concern.</p> <p>Worksafe BC will be ramping up inspections with a focus on the effectiveness of falling supervision.</p>

BC First Aid	Presentation Russell English at HS Meeting	on-going	Presentation from Russell English on the new BC First Aid Regulations effective Nov 1 2024. Regs now point to the CSA Standard Z-1210-17. Schedule 3-A First Aid Kits are now on WSBC website also. There are templates to help with injury risk assessments which must be done (written) for each worksite. Intermediate level FA training is required on high risk worksites. The transportation endorsement remains as before. Previous certificates within last 3 years will be ok, but new certificate will be required as per the new regs. Additional guidance will be provided, beyond that posted in June. Northern Health may be able to help with resources and information on medical facilities and ambulances and their hours and capabilities. Employers have more obligations to plan for emergencies and care and transportation of injured workers. Annual Drills are now required that have to be documented.
